- 35 Her nose was elegant, her eyes glass-grey;
 Her mouth was very small, but soft and red,
 Her forehead certainly was fair of spread,¹⁴
 Almost a span across the brows, I own;¹⁵
 She was indeed by no means undergrown.
- 40 Her cloak, I noticed, had a graceful charm.

 She wore a coral trinket¹⁶ on her arm,

 A set of beads, the gaudies tricked in green,¹⁷

 Whence¹⁸ hung a golden brooch of brightest sheen¹⁹

 On which there first was graven a crowned A,
- 45 And lower, *Amor vincit omnia*.
