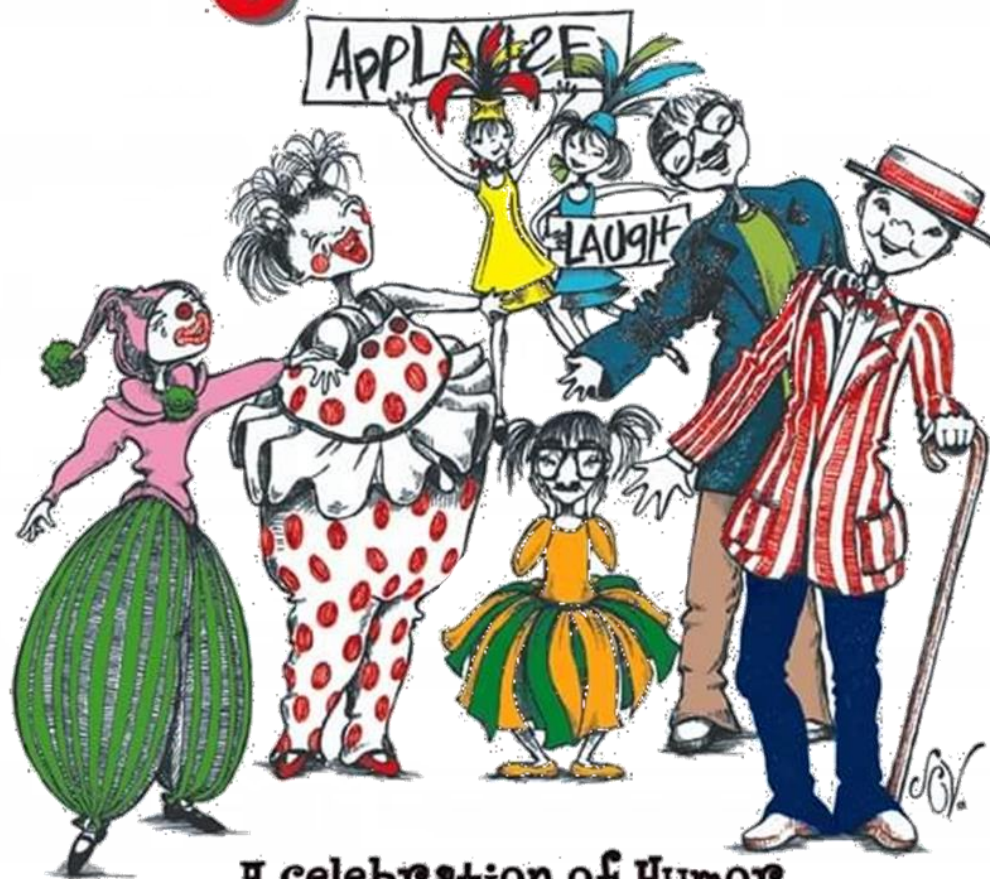

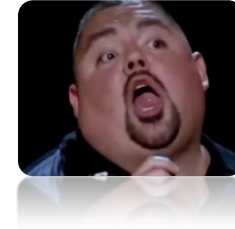


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- Martin and I just got back from India

To have to

- **Have to** is **NOT** an auxiliary verb; therefore it requires an auxiliary verb in the question form or negative.
 - They have to get up early.
- I: **Do** they have to get up early?
- N: They **don't** have to get up early.



have to for objective obligation

- We often use ***have to*** to say that something is **obligatory**, for example:
- Children **have to** go to school.
- You **have to** take an exam at the end of the course.



have to for **impersonal** obligation

- In France, you **have to** drive on the right.
- In England, most school children **have to** wear a uniform.
- John **has to** wear a tie at work.

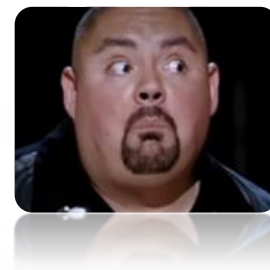
In each of the above cases, the obligation is not the subject's opinion or idea. The obligation comes from outside.



To have to as necessity

- Do, whatever you **have to** do!

*Thus meaning that the driver was supposed to do whatever it was **necessary**.*



	Subject	Auxiliary verb	Main verb <i>have</i>	To - infinitive	
PAST SIMPLE	I		had	to work	yesterday.
PRESENT SIMPLE	I		have	to work	today.
FUTURE SIMPLE	I	will	have	to work	tomorrow .
PRESENT CONTINUOUS	She	is	having	to wait.	
PRESENT PERFECT	We	have	had	to change	the time.
MODAL <i>MAY</i>	They	may	have	to do	it again.





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
